Discussion Questions

1. In the first reading, we learn about how Black abolitionists fought to be able to serve in the Union army.

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- a. Should they have fought in the war even though many Northerners were racist and discriminated against Black people?
- 2. Black abolitionists disagreed over whether or not they should volunteer to fight for the Union.
 - a. In your opinion, which argument was more persuasive? Why or why not?
- 3. One of the main reasons Northern Free Black men wanted to fight in the war was to earn freedom for enslaved Black people in the South.
 - a. Considering they were not directly affected by slavery, should they have still risked their lives to end slavery? Why or Why not?
- 4. You read the perspective of a White commander of a Black regiment.
 - a. Given the racism of the time period, do you think it was possible for White commanding officers to treat Black solders as equal to White soldiers? Why or Why not?
 - b. Do you think Black soldiers should have fought to only be led by Black commanders? Why or Why not?
