James Weldon Johnson

artist, lawyer, activist

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Background Information Born: June 17, 1871 Death: June 26, 1938

James was born in Jacksonville, Florida. His father was a waiter and his mother was a schoolteacher in a segregated school, where James attended and got his education. His mother encouraged him to pursue education, reading, and music. He attended college at Atlanta University and graduated college with a Bachelor's Degree in 1894. After graduating he became the principal of his former school and decided to become a lawyer.¹

Johnson's Resistance

In 1898, Johnson became the first Black person to pass the bar exam in Florida, allowing him to be a lawyer.² While working as a lawyer, Johnson also wrote poetry and songs. In 1901, he and his brother moved to New York and began writing over 200 songs for Broadway. His most well-known song is "Lift Every Voice and Sing", which became the anthem of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP). Johnson also worked as a secretary for the NAACP. He expanded membership and opened new branches across the country. He worked tirelessly to raise awareness against lynching, racism, and segregation.

While in New York, Johnson was also involved in politics. He served as a consul to Venezuela and Nicaragua under President Teddy Roosevelt. Johnson was also an author and published numerous novels including his famous "The Autobiography of an Ex-Coloured Man".³

Achievements

"Lift Every Voice and Sing" continues to serve as a culturally relevant commemorative staple during Black History Month. Johnson played a prominent role in the Harlem Renaissance as well. Johnson received the Spingarn Medal from the NAACP for outstanding achievement.⁴
